HealthRight Mission

HealthRight (formerly Doctors of the World-USA) works with local partners to build lasting access to health in excluded communities.

HealthRight: Focus Areas

- **TB and AIDS epidemics**
prevention, treatment, support, stigma reduction
- **Orphans and vulnerable children**
foster care, community-based services
de-institutionalization, family preservation
- **Women's health**
safe motherhood, equal access to information, education
and service
- **Survivors of gross human rights abuses**
services for those who have been tortured,
trafficked, seek asylum

Human Rights Clinic

- **Term:** 1993 - Present
- **Sites:** California, Colorado, Arizona, New York, New Jersey, other East Coast states
- **Objective:** Train & deploy volunteer physicians/mental health experts to conduct evaluations of and prepare affidavits for those seeking asylum based on claims of torture; refer asylum seekers for follow-up health and social services

HRC in Numbers

- Trained >695 health professionals (340 physicians). >520 joined volunteer network.
- Asylum seekers without HRC assistance have average success rate of ~25%, with HRC help, about 80-90%
- Provided >3000 forensic evaluations to survivors of torture

HRC Photo Database

Why is it needed?

- Almost no formal training in medical education institutions on recognizing the patterns and clinical sequelae of torture
- No 'handbooks' or 'clinical reference manuals' for providers working with survivors of torture

HRC Photo Database

What is it?

- Created in 2008 with NCB grant
- Database of 200+ pictures of scars on the bodies of survivors of torture
- Pictures taken by HRC physician volunteers
In the course of forensic evaluations

HRC Photo Database Content

What is in it?

NOTE: All identifying information has been removed from database entries and photographs. Clients' full faces and names are not included in the database.

However, maintaining client privacy is of paramount importance to HealthRight. This, along with the sensitive and graphic nature of the content, is why HealthRight requires database users to be HealthRight volunteers or to apply for permission to use the database.

Content: Instruments of Torture

- Gun-butts
- Cutting instruments -
Knife, machete, spear,

other electrical
instruments
- Ropes, Hand-cuffs
- Heated Instruments
- Fire
- Chemicals

Content: Immediate Sequelae

- Crushed muscle
- Stab Wound, cuts, lacerations
- Fracture
- Burn
- Dislocation
- Swelling/Bruising
- Dental Trauma
- Scabies/Rashes
- Abrasions
- Peeled skin
- Crushed Bone
- Broken bones
- Amputation
- Heavy Bleeding/Hemorrhage

Content: Late Sequelae

- Scars
- Broken bones
- Disfiguration of body parts
- Keloids/hypertrophic scarring
- Dislocation
- Loss of body parts
- Dental trauma
- Loss of muscle mass and tissue
- Restraint tattoos
- Fistula
- Palsy/Other Neurologic sequelae
- Demo Photos (Simulations of torture)

How was the content compiled?

- HRC screens client through attorney for scars
- HRC physician conducts exam – takes digital pictures of scars and writes affidavit
- Pictures provided to HRC and included as part of evidence
- HRC selects pictures and gathers corresponding information from client's and physician's affidavits
- HRC uploads pictures and corresponding information to the database

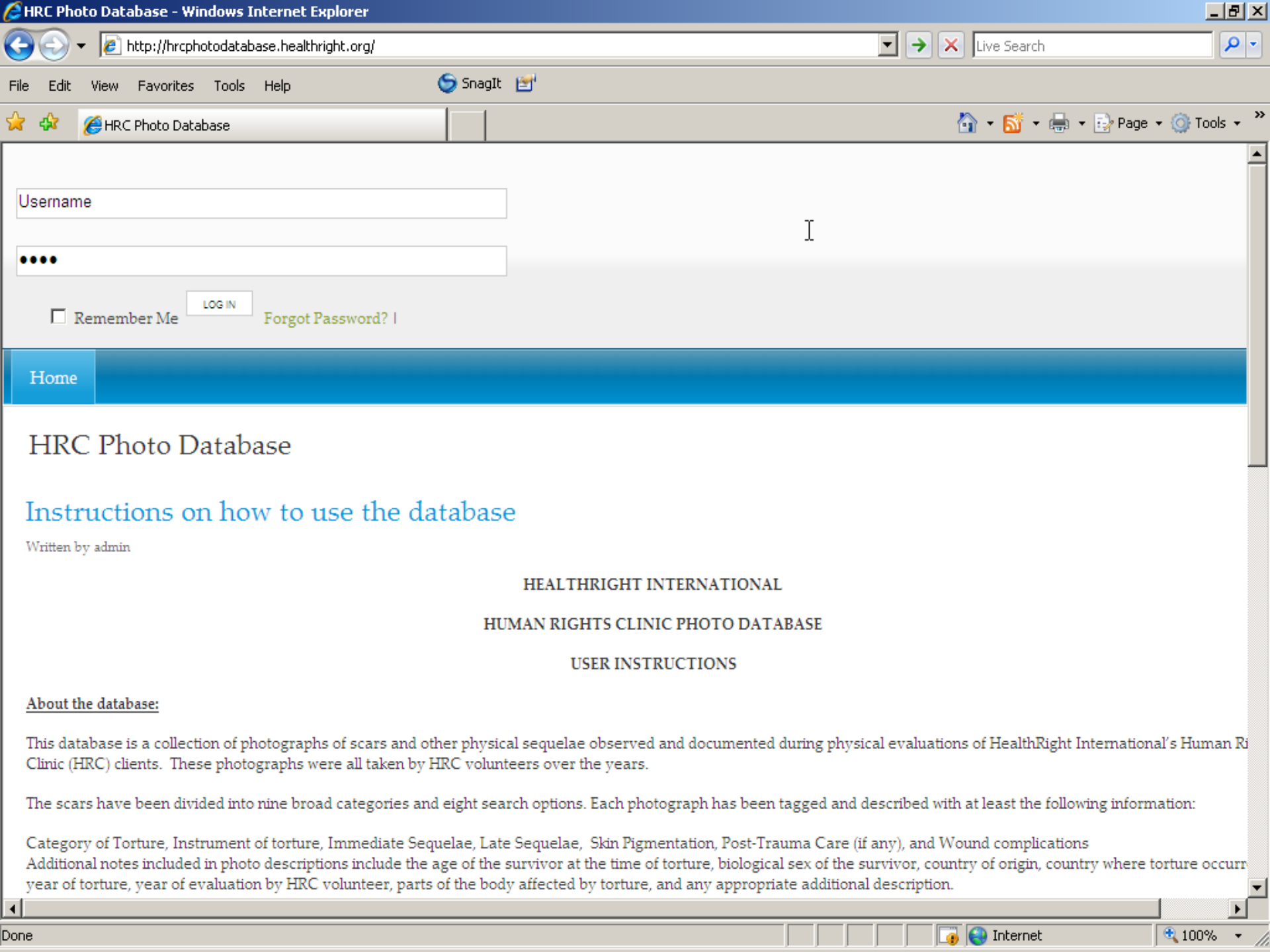

About the database:

This database is a collection of photographs of scars and other physical sequelae observed and documented during physical evaluations of HealthRight International's Human Rights Clinic (HRC) clients. These photographs were all taken by HRC volunteers over the years.

The scars have been divided into nine broad categories and eight search options. Each photograph has been tagged and described with at least the following information:

Category of Torture, Instrument of torture, Immediate Sequelae, Late Sequelae, Skin Pigmentation, Post-Trauma Care (if any), and Wound complications
Additional notes included in photo descriptions include the age of the survivor at the time of torture, biological sex of the survivor, country of origin, country where torture occurred, year of torture, year of evaluation by HRC volunteer, parts of the body affected by torture, and any appropriate additional description.

The database should assist HRC volunteers to compare the scars they encounter on their clients' bodies to the ones in the database and make informed deductions in their affidavits on behalf of survivors of torture. This database may also enable HRC volunteers to conduct informative research and develop publications.

Live Search: Example

- Find pictures of scars on the shoulder from penetrating injuries with cutting instruments in South Asia region for which the survivor received suturing after the incident.

Picture Details

- Click on the link above the picture that says 'Photo <Number>

Using the search results

- Depends on your need

Using the search results

- Compare scars for assessment if scars seem similar
 - ◆ Does my client's scar look similar to the one I found here?
 - ◆ What is different?
 - ◆ Is the other information (instrument used, age of the scar at the time of evaluation etc) matching or similar to my client's?

Using the search results

■ Research?

- ◆ What are the patterns and trends in torture by country?
- ◆ By gender?
- ◆ By year of torture in a given country?

Using the search results

- Teaching? Training?
 - ◆ Pick a demonstrative picture and use it to train physicians to recognize physical signs and sequelae of torture.

Next Steps

- Revisit the database thoroughly, ensuring the accuracy and comprehensiveness of information
- Weed out repetitive pictures
- Review by an experienced physician
- Quarterly update with new pictures
- Continually seek feedback from users and improve the usefulness of the database
