CLIENTS CAME FROM **35** COUNTRIES:

The most common countries of origin were: Ethiopia, Cameroon, DRC, Liberia, and Bosnia & Herzegovina



AFTER CVT TREATMENT, CLIENTS' IMPROVEMENTS included:

89% of clients reported improved PTSD symptoms

86% of clients reported improved depression symptoms

82% of clients reported improved community engagement

79% of clients reported improved anxiety symptoms

79% of clients reported improved stabilization

77% of clients reported improved social support

72% of clients reported improved somatic symptoms
