Luke 10:29-37 (NKJV) ... Who is my neighbor? Who Is My Neighbor?

Many of the neighbors you see everyday have traveled to this country fearing religious and other types of persecution.

Many neighbors leave their children and family behind, running in fear for

their lives for speaking against the evils that exist in their native environment.

They come here in hope of freedom and are in many cases, rejected by our citizens. We think they take our

jobs. We think they speak funny. We think they should immediately learn our language. Neighbors come with their children who are

sometimes taunted and often hurt in schools by other children because they are different.

Neighbor-children often have to speak for their parents who, sometimes, do not understand the language.

Imagine having your child speak for you! Most come with little, or no hope. They have no shelter, no food, and no money.

Similar to the victim in the good Samaritan story in Luke Chapter 10.

Beaten and bruised, mentally and physically

and left half dead on the road-so to speak.

Many new neighbors come here with visions

of family members hurt, maimed or killed, yet must move past these visions to survive and obtain access to living space, food, work and clothing. Children must function by going to school, being obedient to their parents, at times, having to speak for a parent who does not understand the language. Many parents, who have brought their children to this country, have cultural disciplines, which they enforce, and then their children are taken away because they believe children should not rule the home. Their children are growing and learning the freedoms of this country which appear to be somewhat different from other cultures.

Who is my neighbor?

Lutheran Children and Family Service is a non profit organization, an affiliate of Liberty Lutheran Services

Many newcomers have been served through the generosity of a cadre of Lutheran Churches who help our neighbors settle into a new environment by: adopting a family-literally taking responsibility for a family for three months, supplying food and shelter, while empowering new neighbors to become self sufficient.

An excellent example of a good Samaritan!!

The Liberty Center for Survivors of Torture (LC)

The Liberty Center (LC) was initiated in October 2001 with a six-year grant from the Department of Health and Human Services. In addition, many organizations and individual donors have supported the LC through their eight-year existence. Due to diminished financial support, the LC will be unable to continue to serve as a good Samaritan. Our Parent companies, Liberty Lutheran Services and Lutheran Children and Family Service (*non profits*) can no longer carry the weight of the LC. The Liberty Center for the past eight years

has served over 400 families and individual victims of torture by assisting in the reconstruction of their lives while empowering them to regain a sense of self-worth and the potential to reassert themselves into new communities. Our neighbors have many mountains to climb to remain in this country. They must obtain food and shelter, take the steps necessary (and there are many) to obtain a work permit. If they are eligible, they must attain a job to support themselves and family, and at the same time push aside in their minds, the horrors they have escaped in their country, all while applying for a green card (which takes years to obtain) to be able to remain in this country. Many women participants come from cultures where actions taken against them, by their spouse, would be considered domestic violence in this country. Women are afraid to come forward because domestic violence is an immediate reason for deportation back to the country they fled. Spouse's keep paperwork that would empower woman to the freedoms of this country-keeping them in bondage.

What are our fears?

We, in this country, believe our new neighbors are taking our jobs, social security funds, food stamps and medical assistance. In reality, our new neighbors perform the task we chose not to do. Many are working and paying into the social security system and are unable to receive those benefits.

Some are disabled and need food stamps and medical assistance to get on their feet, but are generally ineligible.

One example is a 61-year old woman, who takes 3 buses, at 4 a.m., to get to a job which starts at 7 a.m. The position does not offer medical coverage and the salary is barely enough to cover her \$400/mo rent. She applied for and was eligible for food stamps which helps sustain her. She was not eligible for medical assistance which she needs due to daily chronic pain.

Survivors have suffered acts of tortures that have profound impact upon their health and ability to function in society. Our mission is to help repair some of the wreckage, while confirming our commitment to human dignity and freedom.

We are stretching our hands out to the children of God, organizations, individuals, and families that we may continue to support victims of torture and their families.
